GENERAL MANAGER'S STATUS REPORT

April 11, 2023

Treatment Plants

The treatment plants continue to meet constituent discharge requirements on a routine basis. There have been no discharge violations due to Equipment Failure. On March 15, 2023 the Huston Creek WWTP had a spill due to construction debris clogging the Trickling Filters. The spill was not able to be controlled in the sandbed and was expected to have entered Huston Creek. The State was notified, operations and maintenance crew were able to stop the spill, and lab results can back negative for contamination into Lake Silverwood. We do not anticipate any fines at this time.

Collection System

Crews are continuing with regular operations, daily inspections of District lift stations, issuance of correction notices for repairs on private laterals, and inspections on all repairs. Throughout the month, collection staff inspected waterways and the district effluent outfall line after all rain events. For the month of March, the district hydraulically cleaned 6,389 feet of line. In the month of February the district hydraulically cleaned 11,528 feet of line and televised 3188 feet.

Strategic Plan

The District is proceeding with getting phase one of the Master Plan accomplished.

Applied to the State Revolving Fund and are now on the list to be funded.

Regulatory Compliance: District is maintaining a >90% compliance currently through the 2023 calendar year...i.e., < 2 SSO's, RWQCB Plant Discharge Requirements.
